The City recently honored international musical artist Vicente Fernández with a street renaming ceremony at the Pico Rivera Sports Arena this past August.

Fernández's command of ranchera and mariachi styles of music attracted fans far beyond Mexico's borders into right here in the City of Pico Rivera. Many residents here can recall hearing his music at home or at a family member's house, or in person at one of the many live shows held at concert venues throughout Southern California, including the Pico Rivera Sports Arena.

Each performance at the Sports Arena drew thousands of residents and concertgoers to the City, proving Fernández was a beloved figure among area residents, regardless of age.

To honor Fernández's legacy, City officials held a special street renaming ceremony, formally renaming Sports Arena Drive to Avenida Vicente Fernández, after the beloved musician. The ceremony was attended by Vicente Fernández Jr., the singer's eldest child, and his wife, Mariana, who flew in from Mexico specifically to join in the celebration honoring his father. State and local elected officials also attended the ceremony, providing

certificates and proclamations to Vicente Jr., in recognition of the event.

The idea of honoring Vicente
Fernández was first made in 2019 when
a City delegation traveled to Mexico
to meet with Fernández at his ranch to
present the concept of a street naming
at the Sports Arena. Fernández initially
approved of the idea but sadly passed
away before the City could take any
action. Upon the announcement of his
death this past December, a motion

was introduced during a City Council meeting held in December 2021, to rename Sports Arena Drive after the late singer. On May 10, 2022, the City Council formally voted to rename Sports Arena Drive, the primary entrance to the Pico Rivera Sports Arena, to Avenida Vicente Fernández.

The legacy of Fernández's music and his impression on concert attendees at the Sports Arena will forever live on in the City.



A Reminder to Our Pico Rivera **Water Authority Customers**

The Pico Rivera Water Authority has declared a STAGE 2 WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE with mandatory restrictions in place for Pico Rivera Water Authority customers ONLY.

Currently in effect through October 31, a two-day watering schedule allows residents who have even number addresses to water on Monday and Wednesday, while residents with odd number addresses are able to water on Tuesday and Thursday.

Beginning on Tuesday, November 1 through Friday, March 31, a one-day



watering schedule will go into effect. Residents with even addresses can water on Tuesday, and residents with odd addresses can water on Thursday.

Residents are advised to keep the watering brief and to approximately five minutes per station. Residents who use a sprinkler system are asked to run their sprinklers before 8:00 a.m. or after 7:00 p.m. to minimize water evaporation and to maximize the water reaching lawns and plants to keep them healthy. Weekend irrigation is prohibited.

In addition to the watering schedule, mandates on swimming pools and spas were included as part of the Level 2 Water Supply Shortage. Residents for the time being will only be allowed to refill pools or spas of any depth that lost water due to natural evaporation up to one foot in depth. Pools and spas that need initial filling will be prohibited. The filling of ornamental ponds will also be prohibited unless it sustains existing aquatic life.

While residents are doing their part, we too are doing our part. The City continues to use reclaimed water on many at many of our City facilities, medians, parks, and the Golf Course. To help us out even further, the City encourages residents to report excessive runoff and broken sprinkler heads by using the service request form on the City's website at picorivera.org or by calling 562.801.4415.

It's important to note that the restrictions announced here are for residents who are customers of the Pico Rivera Water Authority only. Residents who are customers of the Pico Water District or San Gabriel Valley Water Company may follow a similar plan with different watering days and restrictions as outlined by the respective Water Boards.

City Reminds Residents About Trash Can Storage



The Neighborhood Services Division aims to inform residents about property regulations to ensure our community maintains an aesthetically pleasing appearance.

One current regulation that many residents may not be aware of is the storing of trash cans in public view or allowing them to remain on the curbside beyond trash collection day. These violations of the City's municipal ordinance, PRMC 8.16.010, are not permissible.

As a reminder, the municipal code states that trash receptacles along with blue and green waste containers may be placed in their designated area for removal by NASA Services between 12:00 Noon on the day preceding collection and must be removed by 12:00 Noon the day after trash collection. For example, if your trash collection is on Thursday, trash containers may be placed in their designated area beginning at 12:00 Noon on Wednesday, and they are required to be removed no later than 12:00 Noon on Friday.

Please remember that all trash receptacles must be stored away from public view during times of non-collection. Residents who violate this policy will be given one (1) warning letter. Any resident who continues to leave their trash receptacles out after that initial warning, the owner of that property will receive a citation. Citations start at One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and are cumulative.

Chamber to **Host E-Waste Recycling Event**

The Pico Rivera Chamber of Commerce will be hosting an E-Waste Recycling event at Pico Park on Saturday, October 15, and Sunday, October 16, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

E-Waste is any consumer electronic equipment that has reached its "end-of-life" or "end-of-usage," whether in full or non-working condition.

Acceptable items to recycle at this event include computer monitors, TV's, PC systems, printers, laptops, copiers, scanners, fax machines, toner cartridges, UPS PDA's, power supplies, mainframe units, networking equipment, motherboard systems, VCR/VCD/DVD players, home entertainment systems, landline and cell phones, and small portable devices. Also accepted at this event will be car and forklift batteries. There will be a service charge for major appliances, including cooling units, and microwaves. Fluorescent light bulbs and household batteries will not be accepted.

City Unveils New Transportation Program

The City's Dial-A-Ride program recently received a major facelift. During a ceremony held last month, the City unveiled three new buses with a new design scheme that coincides with the rebranding of the City's transportation program, Pico Rivera Transit (PRT).

The City's transportation program began in June of 1984 with three purpose-built vans that would be used for a new Dial-A-Ride program. Since then, thousands of senior and disabled riders have used the free curb-to-curb service for local drop off within the City, or they have used it for scheduled doctor's appointments in or outside the City limits. In 2012, the City's transportation program grew and was separated between two programs, the Dial-A-Van program, and the introduction of the Dial-A-Cab program. Dial-A-Cab provides low-cost fare transportation while adding more vehicles to the existing transportation program.

Within the last few years, the number of riders had increased, putting a strain on the current transportation program. The Dial-A- Van program itself was operating with only two vehicles, causing delays and scheduling conflicts. The two vehicles used for Dial-A-Van had reached the end of their operational life, and the City took this opportunity to purchase new vans while rebranding the entire transportation program to help better serve our residents.

During last month's ceremony, three new vans were unveiled, and the City's Dial-A-Van program officially became part of PRT. PRT will now encompass all of the City's transportation assets including Dial-A-Van, and Dial-A-Cab, and also includes assistance with applying for Access Service, the ADA Complementary Paratransit service for functionally disabled individuals in Los Angeles County. In addition, PRT provides discounted monthly passes to be purchased with Los Angeles Metropolitan Transit Authority (MTA) for students, seniors, and disabled residents. Students, seniors, and disabled residents can add discounted passes at the Pico Rivera Senior Center, and Pico Rivera Library, during regular business hours.

For regular users of the Dial-A-Van

program and Dial-A-Cab program, PRT will continue to provide curb-tocurb service to any destination in the City and provide transportation to medical appointments up to six miles out of City limits.

New users of the Dial-A-Van and Dial-A-Cab programs can register at the Pico Rivera Senior Center, Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Users of the previous Dial-A-Ride program are encouraged to update their information at the Senior Center to ensure picture and contact information is accurate. Program registration is free until December 22, 2022. Applications received after January 1, 2023, will be charged a \$5.00 processing fee.

With all these transportation components in place, City officials are looking at expanding the PRT program in the future to provide even more transportation options for City residents.

Athletic from an early age, Nathan was three when he played for the Bambinos in Pico Boys. He continued to play baseball until his interest waned as he was entering high school. He tried other sports including basketball, even making it on an all-star team. It wasn't until he followed in his brother's footsteps that he found boxing to b his calling. He fell in love with the sport, and turned professional at the age of 16. Because of the rules here in the U.S., Nathan could not fight until he was 18. So he began fighting internationally, in Costa Rica and Mexico, earning his reputation and earning a spotless record.

With his birthday approaching, Nathan had wanted to make his professional debut in the U.S., more specifically in the City where he grew up. Naming Smith Park as the boxing venue, Nathan made quite the impression on boxing fans and City residents. His fight was the main event of the night, and fans were ready to cheer him on. Within two minutes after the first bell rang, Nathan did not disappoint. Lasting only 2:11, Nathan ended the fight with a knockout victory over Moises Flores. This improved Rodriguez's record to 9-0, with 7 knockouts, and made a lasting impression with everyone in attendance and watching on the livestream.

Pio Pico Woman's Club Helping College-Bound Students

The Pio Pico Woman's Club continues to make education and going to college the number one priority for the youth of Pico Rivera. While going to college is a great achievement for students, it's an even greater achievement for those who will be the first in their families to attend college.

This year, the Pio Pico Woman's Club has given a total of \$57,000 in scholarship funding in partnership with the Jeraldine Bates Memorial Fund. The Pio Pico Woman's Club was able to provide \$15,000 in scholarships to the students of the El Rancho Unified School District. Eight students from El Rancho High School each received a scholarship worth \$1,000 each, while four students from Ruben Salazar High School each received a \$1,000 scholarship, two students from Ellen Ochoa Prep Academy each received a \$1,000 scholarship, and two students participating in the Culinary Arts Program each received a \$500 scholarship.

The Jeraldine Bates Memorial Fund has been working with the Pio Pico Woman's Club for the past eight years to provide funding for the scholarships listed below. This year through the fund, a total of \$42,000 in scholarship funds have been dispersed to the recipients. If the receiving students maintain a 3.5 GPA during each college school year, they will continue to receive \$6,000 per year until their graduation.

Preparing for Halloween:

- » Ensure costumes and accessories are flame-resistant. Keep costumes short enough to prevent tripping or entanglement.
- » Try make-up instead of a mask. Masks can be uncomfortable, and may limit or block vision.
- » Place reflective tape on costumes and trickor-treat bags for greater visibility.
- » Plan and review with your children their trickor-treating route. A parent or responsible adult should accompany young kids.

Reminders for Trick-or-Treaters:

- » Make your trick-or-treat stops only at familiar homes that have the outside light on.
- » Never enter a stranger's home or car for a treat.
- » Do not eat your treats until they are thoroughly checked by an adult at home.
