## 5 YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT BUDGET PASSED

The City of Pico Rivera will be busy with several projects as the Five-Year Capital Improvement Project (CIP) Budget was passed during a City Council meeting held in October.

The passage of the CIP Budget paves the way for City staff to begin on several projects throughout the City in the upcoming year.

Beginning at the north of the City, the Pico Rivera Teen Center will undergo much needed renovation improvements. The project includes some cosmetic repairs and improvements such as roof repair, interior and exterior painting, new flooring, and outdoor fencing.

When the Pico Rivera Senior Center is allowed by Health Officials to re-open, the restroom facilities will have been updated to the most current ADA standards, enhancing the safety of those facilities for the patrons that use them.

More ADA upgrades will be made at Pico Rivera City Hall. Upgrades include ADA compliancy in the City Hall public restrooms, elevator, and entrance ramps to City Hall for easier accessibility for residents.

“Our public facilities are what our residents and visitors use on a daily basis. These cosmetic improvements and ADA enhancements will not only provide even more accessibility to our residents, they will also ensure that

these facilities remain in use for years to come,” said City Manager Steve Carmona.

While our facilities will be getting renovated and upgraded, the City’s sidewalks and roads will also be improved through the City’s Annual Sidewalk Replacement Program and Annual Signing and Striping Project.

The Annual Sidewalk Replacement Project ensures the safety of our residents by repairing or maintaining damaged sidewalks or the installation of new sidewalks in high pedestrian areas where sidewalks are not available.

Many drivers can appreciate the Annual Signing and Striping Project throughout the City. Each year, City staff remove and replace existing signage, and re-stripe faded roadway markings throughout the City. This project allows for better visibility of signs and roadway markings day or night; making for safer travel for motorists traversing City roads.

Another roadway project that many motorists will surely appreciate is set to begin next year. This project will be the rehabilitation of Rosemead Boulevard from Whittier Boulevard to Gallatin Road. This rehabilitation project will include re-paving this roadway segment and reconstructing portions of pavement along this roadway segment, installation of signs, crosswalks, and curbs.



“Fixing our City streets is one of our top priorities, and we take advantage at any opportunity provided to us to fix them,” said Carmona.

With a couple of more projects down the pipeline, the cost of the scheduled projects for the upcoming year alone come at a cost of just over \$33 million. All of which is funded through various sources such as Community Development Block Grant funds, and Measure R Funds, to name a few. “We are going to be busy this year and in the next few years. We have

much work to do despite the current pandemic,” said Carmona. “These are projects that needed to take place to ensure the highest quality of life for our residents.”

## City Continues to Invest in Clean Water for its Residents

The City of Pico Rivera is taking the first steps in ensuring that water delivered to the customers of the Pico Rivera Water Authority (PRWA) is safe for use and consumption.

Back in 2019, the State Water Resources Control Board announced updated guidelines for local water agencies to follow in detecting

and reporting the presence of perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) and perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) in drinking water. The Board also announced it had begun the process of establishing regulatory standards for these chemicals.

Based on the most current results, it was determined that the Notification Level for perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) and perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) in the groundwater served to customers of PRWA had been exceeded but was below the Response Level. Notification Level warrants further monitoring and assessment while Response Level is higher and requires a taking a water source out of service or provide treatment if available. Currently, all Pico Rivera Water Authority Wells remain in operation.

During the City Council meeting held last month, City Administration was given the authority to seek bids for a Polyfluoralkyl Substances (PFAS) Treatment System Project. This project will seek to treat and remove PFOS and PFOA chemicals and other contaminants in the water provided by the Pico Rivera Water Authority.

“As we take this huge first step, we want to show our residents our commitment to water safety and that we are taking the necessary steps in addressing this issue,” said City Manager Steve Carmona.

City Staff is currently working with an engineering firm for the design, bidding and construction support services for the PFAS Treatment System Project.

The City of Pico Rivera is among several communities and water agencies in Southern California that

are facing the same issue with their water supply.

“Residents need to know that the water delivered to customers of the Pico Rivera Water Authority still meets and exceeds all State and Federal drinking water standards,” stated Carmona. “The water continues to be safe for consumption and use.”

The project is currently in the preliminary phase with construction an implementation set to take place later this year.

## Durfee Grade Separation Project Update

Over the last few months, significant progress has been made on the Durfee Avenue Grade Separation Project.

Since December, several 40-ton steel girders were installed. The girders will support the 95-foot-long railroad bridge over Durfee Avenue. Last month, construction crews began work on the retaining walls that will support the roadway underpass and railroad bridge along Durfee Avenue.

Durfee Avenue remains closed until May 2022, when the new roadway is anticipated to open to all traffic. Currently, access to businesses located on Durfee Avenue near the closure that are allowed to operate per the latest Health Orders are not impacted by the road closure, and access is available at all times.

Once completed, the \$107.8 million Grade Separation Project will substantially minimize the issue of emergency responders seeking alternate routes due to blocked access and eliminate the harmful emissions from idling vehicles waiting for the trains to pass. Another issue that is being addressed with this project is pedestrian and bicyclist safety. New pedestrian sidewalks will be installed on both sides of the roadway underneath the bridge, and a dedicated bicycle lane traveling northbound and southbound will be included in the roadway design. This will allow pedestrians and bicyclists to safely traverse along Durfee Avenue in a safe manner without the worry of an oncoming train. Finally, much of the noise pollution associated with trains will be reduced when locomotive horn noise is eliminated as they no longer have to blow their horn when approaching an at-grade crossing.

The Durfee Avenue Grade Separation Project is in partnership with the Alameda Corridor-East Project (ACE), the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments, The City of Pico Rivera, Metro, the U.S. Department of Transportation, the California Transportation Commission, Caltrans, and Union Pacific Railroad.

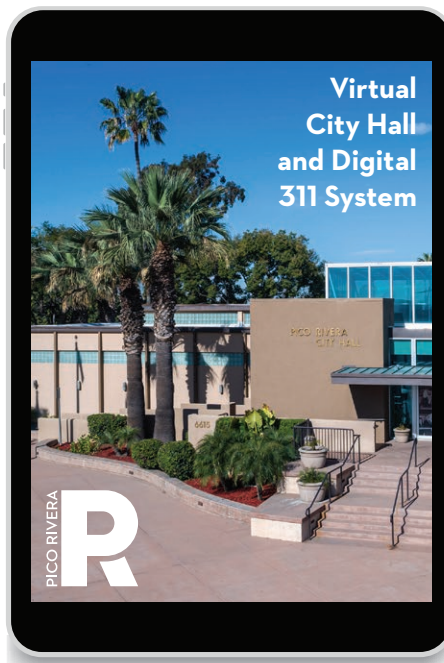

City Staff are steadily advancing implementation of the City's Virtual City Hall & 311 System (VCH + 311). The new VCH + 311 is a comprehensive effort to provide virtual, on-demand city services while ensuring more accurate and immediate transparency.

Thanks in part to a grant from the Department of Justice, the new system will enable residents, businesses, stakeholders, and visitors to submit, track and manage service requests, transactions, communications, and much more with the City. Reporting issues such as potholes, broken street lights, graffiti removal will be much easier. Managing payments for utilities, fees, park reservations, business and pet licenses and more will be centrally located in a secure and personal account portal. The VCH + 311 system will also enable customizable information dashboards so residents can actively track progress on projects, programs, and other City initiatives that are of interest to you.

This technology will not only enhance services for our residents, it will also help minimize exposure to COVID-19 and enhance public engagement. Although the VCH + 311 will launch in early Spring 2021, new features and functionality will be added on a regular basis. Over time, the system will grow and evolve to ensure a better, more interactive virtual experience for all.

Our streets have new, brighter lights thanks to the most recent progress of the City's Streetlight Acquisition, LED Conversion, and Operations & Maintenance Project.

Since November 2020, the City took ownership of over 3,000 streetlights previously owned and operated by Southern California Edison (SCE). The City successfully replaced all of the High-Pressure Sodium (HPS) fixtures with new, energy-efficient Light Emitting Diodes (LED) fixtures. LED lights have several benefits, including improved lighting to increase public safety and on-going maintenance and energy savings.

One of the project's design approaches is **standardization**, which means there is not much variation between light fixtures throughout the City.

**Safety** is a major priority, and LEDs are the general street lighting industry preference for various reasons. The color temperatures for these lights are available in a wide

range from warm white to daylight (2700K to 6000K), and we've selected lights in the 3000K range.

Reducing wasted resources while increasing performance levels are system **efficiency** goals. LED fixtures consume less energy because they have control functions to adjust the amount of light needed while more light reaches a selected area. The new streetlights waste significantly less energy than HPS because LEDs produce minimal heat emission, and don't require a warm-up or cool-down period. The estimated lifespan of LED streetlights is 25,000 to 200,000 hours, which means these lights can last anywhere from 5 to 50 years. The average lifespan of an HPS streetlight is only 4 to 5 years. While LEDs last longer, they also use about a third of the wattage used by HPS lights. In addition to conserving energy the City's streetlights run on PRIME Future, the 100% renewable energy product, that together have a positive impact on our carbon emissions.

**Operations** and maintenance will be performed by a team of licensed professionals from Tanko Lighting. LED lights are not as fragile as HPS glass bulbs and do not shatter with mechanical shocks from power

outages or physical shocks from wind force. Unlike HPS lights that flicker near the end of their useful life, LED lights gradually dim over time. With all of these benefits and the 20-year life expectancy of the fixtures, the City will have a significant reduction in maintenance and operation costs.

Lastly, the City is collaborating with Southern California Regional Energy Network (SoCalREN) to assist with rebates and a full energy assessment to maximize our savings from the LED conversion. Installation of the LED streetlight fixtures began in late November 2020 and was completed in January 2021. There will be a second phase of the project to upgrade the remaining 600 decorative fixtures, which have already gone through an audit and mapping process.

The Streetlight Acquisition, LED Conversion, and Operations & Maintenance Project was awarded to Tanko Lighting of San Francisco, CA, in March 2019. ## Streamlined Planning and Building Review

On December 2, 2020, the City was awarded \$300,000 in grant funds from the State's Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) through the Local Early Action Planning Grants program (LEAP). These funds will be utilized to purchase online permitting and interactive digital systems that will expedite the processing of plan approvals and building permits to assist with housing development in the City. In the future, plans can be submitted, reviewed, and staff corrections/comments added electronically, providing real-time communication between the applicant and City Staff.

Providing residents and businesses with online permitting and interactive digital systems will streamline planning and building submittals and review processes, increase transparency and speed up housing production.

## Responses to Housing Element Update Survey Needed

The City of Pico Rivera is in the process of updating the Housing Element of the General Plan. This update is the 6th Cycle for the 2021-2029 planning period. As part of the update, the City wants to hear from residents to help shape the new Housing Element policies, goals, objectives, and programs by receiving your responses to the survey posted on the City's website. After using the "scan code icon" or using the website link below, you will be directed to the City's Housing Element Update webpage where you can click on the link for the Survey that is highlighted in blue. You can also find a link to the presentation that was provided to the Planning Commission and during the Virtual Community Workshop held in December.

The State of California provided a statewide housing goal, which required the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) to assess housing production planning goals by City. One of Pico Rivera's challenges is meeting the requirement to plan for the City's Regional Housing Needs Assessment of 1,022 units assigned by SCAG within the 2021-2029 planning period. This does not mean all units need to be built, but the City must "plan" for these units.

This is a tremendous task, and the City needs your help by submitting the type of housing you would like to see, preferred locations for new housing units, Accessory Dwelling Units, and your vision for your City. ## City Facilities Update

Since last March, the City has taken steps upon the advisement of State and County Health Officials to close all City facilities to help slow the spread of COVID-19. The closures affected City Hall, the Senior Center, and our Parks and Community Centers. Over the last couple of months, State and County Health Officials have lifted several restrictions, allowing for the City to open various City facilities and offer City Services.

City Hall is currently open for In-Person Services Tuesday through Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Residents are able to make payments for City services such as Water, Permits, etc., on a walk-up basis with no appointments necessary. Services provided by Community and Economic Development, Public Works, and the City Clerk's office will require an appointment. Appointments for in-person services can be made by calling City Hall at 562.942.2000. In accordance with local Health Orders, masks must be worn at all times, Social

Distancing protocols will be in place, and residents may be subject to temperature and symptom screening.

City Hall continues to offer phone services Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Residents are encouraged to use the City's website for processing payments online and to find answers for many City related questions and services.

Walking Trails and Green Spaces remain open for passive use at our Parks. All Park Playgrounds were just re-opened for public use.

As a reminder, all other amenities such as athletic fields, indoor and outdoor athletic courts, picnic areas, and gazebos remain closed per current Public Health Orders.

The Pico Rivera Senior Center also remains closed to the public, offering services and information over the phone at 562.948.4844.

## Upcoming Phased Rollout of Vaccines

Last month, State and County officials announced the rollout of the much anticipated COVID-19 Vaccine. The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health will be releasing the Vaccine in phases due to the limited quantities that are currently available.

The first phase, **Phase 1A**, is currently underway and includes the following:

- County Residents who are 65 years of age and older
- Healthcare workers and residents of skilled nursing facilities, long-term care facilities, and routine in-person contact.

The second phase, **Phase 1B**, will be underway in early February. This group includes the following:

- Those at risk of exposure at work (Education and Childcare, Emergency Services, Food and Agriculture, Transportation and Logistics, Industrial, Commercial, Residential, and Sheltering Facilities and services, and Critical Manufacturing)
- Congregate settings with outbreak risk (Incarcerated, Homeless)

## Local Resident Receives Childhood Cancer Sibling Scholarship

The costly treatment associated with childhood cancer can lead to long-term financial challenges, including questions of how to afford higher education. Northwestern Mutual, a financial planning firm, has been committed to helping children and families affected by this disease achieve their college dreams. As part of these efforts, local resident Ethan Salmeron has been selected as a 2020 recipient through the company's Childhood Cancer Sibling Scholarship program.

The scholarship program was developed to alleviate the financial strain on families that often results from expensive cancer treatments by helping to fund school tuition and fees. Forty-three students, the largest cohort to date, have each been awarded a \$5,000 renewable scholarship (for a total of \$10,000) through this year's program.

Ethan's younger brother, Jaden, was diagnosed with leukemia when they were both children. He experienced confusion, sadness, and anger, unable to understand why his younger brother was battling cancer. As a result, Ethan decided to focus on factors in life he could control, including school, friendships, and family support. Jaden's cancer battle allowed Ethan to discover his passion for giving back to others as he volunteers at CoachArt and Camp Ronald McDonald.

"I look for volunteer opportunities that better the lives of those around me. I find so much joy in bringing smiles to people's faces," said Ethan Salmeron. "My brother's battle with cancer marks a difficult time in my family's life, yet those struggles are no longer weaknesses, but rather strengths."

Ethan attended St. Marianne's School in Pico Rivera, East Whittier Middle School in Whittier, and graduated from Loyola High School in Los Angeles. Ethan will be pursuing a Major in Entrepreneurship at Loyola Marymount University.

Children who will enroll in kindergarten must be five years old on or before September 1, 2021. Any child who will have his/her fifth birthday from September 2, 2021, through December 2, 2021, shall be offered a transitional kindergarten (TK) program.
